

Sermon Series on the Psalms: Singing Our Lives

Singing is central to Christian worship. In the letter to the Colossians, the author encourages the use of song as response to God for a life centered in Jesus: "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God" (Col. 3:16). It's not surprising that each week we not only lift our voices in



praise and promise to God through hymns but also dwell with those ancient songs we know as the psalms.

For the next three weeks in worship, we will ponder the psalms for each Sunday in a sermon series. We'll consider them as part and parcel of the proclamation of the good news and keys that help unlock our relationship to one another, to our neighbor, and to God.



Music Notes

J.S. Bach's (1685-1750) chorale prelude, *Schmücke dich*, *O liebe Seele* (Soul adorn yourself with gladness) (ELW) is based on the Lutheran chorale by Johann Crüger (1598-1662), one of the early Reformation hymn tune writers. Bach composed an entire cantata on *Schmücke dich* in 1724 and likely intended for this organ chorale prelude to be played during service at communion. In this setting, Bach provides a elaborated tune in the right hand on a solo stop above accompanying chords played by the left hand and pedal.

Noted twelve tone composer, Arnold Schönberg (1874-1951) arranged the Bach chorale prelude for full orchestra in 1922. Go to this **url** to hear Schoenberg's brilliant setting



The CLC Book Group will discuss *The Unbearable Lightness of Being* by Milan Kundera on **Monday August 28** at 7:30 via Zoom.

The Unbearable Lightness of Being tells the story of two women, two men, a dog, and their lives in the 1968 Prague Spring period of Czechoslovak history. Taking place in the late 1960s and early 1970s, it explores the artistic and intellectual life of Czech society through to 1968 and the invasion of Czechoslovakia by the Soviet Union. The aftermath of this pivotal event is seen through the lives of two couples and those around them. Themes of love and fidelity play out against a background of political unrest.

The Coalition is teaming up with Stop Handgun Violence, Moms Demand Action, GIFFORDS, and the Brady Campaign to Prevent Gun Violence for a gun violence prevention advocacy day

on Wednesday September 13th at 10:30am.

Join us as we show the Legislature how important gun violence prevention is to their constituents and help us stand up against the gun lobby.

We will meet at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul at 138 Tremont Street in Boston (across the Common from the State House) to go over logistics for the day and provide you with everything you'll need to be an effective advocate. We will then walk over to the State House together and folks will be split into groups to attend meetings with their legislators.

If you've never been to an advocacy day or the State House before, this is the perfect place to start! We will help you set up meetings with your legislators, walk you through what to expect during those meetings, and ensure that you have everything you need to feel comfortable talking to your legislators.

We're partnering with Moms Demand Action to help organize larger groups of constituents to meet with their legislators.
