### **Day of Mourning**

Many of us will enjoy
Thanksgiving Day by eating
dinner with family or friends and
giving thanks for the many
blessings in our lives. However,
for our Indigenous siblings, the
day the we observe as
Thanksgiving is for them a Day
of Mourning. It is a solemn

occasion to honor Native ancestors and Wampanoag stories while fostering greater awareness and understanding among the American public about the destructive presence of pilgrims and settlers in and around Patuxet, currently also known as Plymouth. This information taken from the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian explains more:

Mainstream narratives about Thanksgiving are told almost exclusively from the perspective of the Pilgrims. As a result, this Eurocentric telling—which often portrays the Wampanoag people who first encountered English settlers at Plymouth, Massachusetts, as nameless, faceless, "Indians"—has become widely accepted as fact. In reality, the Wampanoag, whose name means "People of the First Light," had occupied the region for centuries before the arrival of Europeans. A complex and sophisticated civilization, the Wampanoag had tribal coalitions in place long before the English colonies were established and were far from "wild savages." In fact, it was their daily tradition of giving thanks for nature's gifts that inspired the Thanksgiving myth.

This Thanksgiving we invite you to consider how your family might incorporate an acknowledgement of the harms caused by European settlers to Native Peoples and an acknowledgement of the ongoing contributions of these peoples to our culture. How can we stand with Native Peoples and begin the work of reconciliation and repair? We have much to learn from the wisdom of Indigenous Peoples.

### **Adult Education at CLC**

Our return to Adult Education opportunities at CLC continues in December with a three-week focus on the gospel of Mark! With the change in liturgical year that begins with Advent, we will shift from the gospel of Matthew as our orienting perspective to hearing excerpts from Mark on Sundays. We'll learn a little bit about the author of Mark's point of view as a way to listen with our whole selves to the stories offered.






