

January 15 - *Our Missing Hearts* by Celeste Ng.





The New England Synod Reads: The Myth that Made Us

I am very excited about the opportunity that the Synod's Anti-Racism Team and Camp Calumet have provided to discuss this book! I heard the author, who is a member of St. John's Lutheran Church in Sudbury, speak at Synod Assembly in June.

Mr. Fuhrer explains his research about how systemic racism coupled with our economic system

has created and excused gross inequities. Even more importantly, he outlines steps we could take to fix our system and provide reparation for people of color who have been impacted by these unjust systems.
